Creative writing experience is not necessary

- Poetry—An introduction to the forms and styles of lyric, confessional, and free verse modern poetry. Exercises are designed to help students identify their dominant strengths and hone their poetic ear. Participants should bring a favorite poem to share with the class and an object (a shell, a letter, etc.) that has special meaning.
- February 26 Fiction—A brief lecture will examine the basic elements of fiction: plot, character, dialogue, and setting. A discussion will include examples from well-known literature. Students will spend time focusing on the beginning paragraphs of their ideas for stories and drafts.
- March 5 **Finding Your Voice**—What is voice and how do writers develop and use it to hook readers? Students will examine favorite prose or poetry selections from noted authors to help them identify their own writing voices.
- March 12 **Writing From Personal Experience**—How personal insight, knowledge, and experience can be used in writing. Sharing and listening to different kinds of stories will help identify how these experiences become written pieces.
- March 19 **Revising Your Work**—A checklist of tips and techniques for making first drafts into final drafts will be used to revise unfinished pieces. Constructive comments will also be provided with each finished draft.

March 26

Sharing Your Work—Prior to this session, students will submit a piece of writing the teacher will critique. Selected pieces will be discussed at the workshop to provide experience in reading and critiquing works of other writers. Students will receive written critiques from the teacher.




