

Ladybugs



- Ladybugs are tiny beetles. They live all over the world. There are thousands of different kinds of ladybugs. Four hundred different types live in North America alone.
- These little insects do not develop spots right away. Their colors are light, but they quickly get darker as the ladybugs grow up. Some ladybugs are red with no spots. Some are black with two red spots. Most are red with black spots.
- The adult female ladybug lays many eggs. Tiny larvae, or baby ladybugs, hatch. They look a little like very small alligators. The larvae eat tiny bugs for two weeks. Then they form a case called a "pupa." In one to two weeks an adult ladybug comes out of the pupa. Amazingly, ladybugs don't have what we call "childhood."
- Ladybugs are active when it is warm, but they sleep in cool weather. In winter the insects gather together. They often gather near pine trees and other evergreen plants. That is where people look for ladybugs. Some people look for ladybugs to sell. These people collect hundreds of ladybugs. They pack the ladybugs in boxes with pinecones and pine needles. Some people think this keeps the ladybugs happy.

Who would want to buy ladybugs? Gardeners buy them because 5 ladybugs eat aphids. Aphids are tiny bugs that eat plants. They can destroy a garden. Aphids are a ladybug's favorite food. People let the ladybugs loose in their gardens. The ladybugs eat the aphids and protect the plants. Ladybugs climb along plants. They touch the aphids with their 6 antennae. Then the ladybugs have lunch. A ladybug can eat 50 aphids in one day. Some eat up to 2,000 aphids during their lives. This saves many plants. 7 Do any animals like to eat ladybugs? Sometimes birds eat them. Tree frogs and lizards eat them too. However, the cute little ladybugs have a secret weapon to protect themselves. They give off a smelly substance. It tastes bad too. They also have a hard cover over their wings. These things often protect ladybugs from being eaten. Next time you see a ladybug, think about how important it is.
