This report shows the count and percentage of Hathaway students continuing to receive the scholarship in fall-10. It excludes students who reached 48 hours at a community college and did not continue their education at the University of Wyoming, and students who received a certificate or degree during the 2009-10 school year. A student not receiving the scholarship in fall-10 does not necessarily mean he/she did not enroll.
