





Welcome to the 6th Annual Leadership Symposium

The Wyoming Department of Education is once again delighted to provide an amazing agenda full of esteemed speakers with deep-rooted knowledge and promising practices to share with Wyoming administrators, teachers, related service providers, paraeducators, parents and other staff. Thank you for being here!

This year, the Symposium format has been modified to provide practice opportunities in addition to the always popular legal perspectives (including current hot topics). We know the quality of the presentations here at Wyoming's Leadership Symposium is as good as or better than what you would find at any national conference, but this event allows all participants the opportunity to hear from expert presenters with a specific focus on issues in Wyoming. Also we structure the Symposium with an emphasis on making this an environment that allows participants to interact with speakers and colleagues comfortably in order to make the most of your time here in Lander.

As we end one school year and look forward to another, it is important to take time to recognize the work of Wyoming educators—we have many accomplishments to celebrate! In the past six years, we have seen huge improvements in outcomes for students with disabilities. We have data too: more than 62 percent of students with disabilities spend 80 percent of their school day in a general education classroom, an increase of almost 10 percent since 2005-06. Also, the graduation rate gap between students with and without disabilities has narrowed by over 13%: 62.9 percent of students with disabilities graduate with a regular diploma after four years of high school, which is an increase of almost 13% since 2005-06. Finally, when one compares Wyoming's 2011 PAWS data with those from 2006, we are experiencing significantly higher proficiency rates for students with disabilities in both reading and math. This is fantastic news and reflects the continued focus of district, school and classroom leadership on high quality instruction.

Each of us has the opportunity to be leaders, whether in our homes, at work and/or in our community. As educators, most of us have chosen a path of leadership through service to others and must maintain a keen awareness of how our actions affect those around us. Use your time at the Symposium to learn new skills, expand knowledge or refine current practice, but be willing to immerse yourself in something that challenges you to be extraordinary. We may not be able to control all aspects of our jobs, but how we perform our jobs is entirely within our control.

CO-TEACHING: “CLASSROOM PARTNERSHIPS TO IMPROVE STUDENT OUTCOMES”

The field of education has been changing rapidly over the past decade, and the changes promise to continue. Increased emphasis on higher standards, early and intensive interventions to improve students’ achievement, and more attention to preventing behavior problems characterize today’s schools. All students are affected by these changes, including those who are gifted/talented, those with disabilities, those who are “average,” and those who are English Language Learners. They must access the curriculum, be taught by highly qualified teachers, and achieve the academic benchmarks being set. For students with special needs, this often means an increased emphasis on learning in the general education settings, and one option for accomplishing this that is receiving widespread attention is co-teaching.

The purpose of this workshop is to provide an overview of co-teaching as well as detailed information about effectively planning, implementing, and evaluating co-teaching programs. Participants will have the opportunity to explore both the conceptual and the operational aspects of this innovative approach to providing an education to students in the least restrictive environment as well as discussing issues and concerns related to their own practices. The goal is to ensure that participants take their practice to the next level, designing instruction that fully utilizes the contributions of each professional so that all students reach their potential.

Dr. Clayton Cook

Dr. Clayton Cook is currently an Assistant Professor at the University of Washington. He received his PhD from the University of California, Riverside. He has previous experience working as a paraprofessional, teacher and school psychologist. He also worked at Boys Town in Omaha, Nebraska in the Behavioral Pediatrics and Family Services Outpatient Clinic. Following his time at Boys Town, he did a stint as a professor at Louisiana State University. Dr. Cook has published numerous peer-reviewed articles and three books on the topic of students with or at risk for emotional and behavioral disorders and the application of RTI practices for these students. When he is not teaching and conducting research at the University of Washington, he serves as an educational consultant working with school systems across the country on developing and implementing RTI models of service delivery in both general and restrictive educational settings.

Tara Ford, Esq.

Tara Ford is the co-director and co-founder of Pegasus Legal Services for Children, a non-profit organization in Albuquerque, New Mexico. She has been involved in children's issues for over fifteen years and has worked with many courageous and dedicated parents and caregivers who strive to ensure that children have what they need at home, in their schools and communities. In 2005 the State Bar of New Mexico recognized Ms. Ford for her "Outstanding Contribution to People with Disabilities." She was also awarded the 2004 Children's Champion in Legal Advocacy from Parents for Behaviorally Different Children. Pegasus Legal Services for Children was awarded the 2006 Justice Mary Walters Award from the UNM Women's Law Caucus and the Henrietta Pettijohn award from the NM Women's Bar Foundation. Ms. Ford is a graduate of Stanford Law School.

Melisa Genaux, M.Ed.

Melisa Genaux works with school districts across the country as a consultant and trainer in the areas of Asperger Syndrome and other Autism Spectrum Disorders, behavior and classroom management, applied behavioral analysis, social skills instruction, consultation skills, and special education legal/compliance issues. She has worked for many years as a program supervisor and special education coordinator, Behavior and Autism Specialist, and professional consultant to the Utah State Office of Education.

Recognized nationally as an expert in her field, Melisa now directs and presents at workshops and conferences for teachers, parents, school administrators, and related services staff. In addition, she provides extensive consultation services to schools in program development and individual student case management. She is a recipient of multiple awards from the Utah Council for Children with Behavioral Disorders and has published articles in the national Behavioral Disorders Journal as well as the Utah Special Educator. She has written and produced videos for LRP Publications and has been a speaker at the LRP National Institute on Legal Issues of Educating Students with Disabilities for the past 12 years.

Amy Goetz, Esq.

Amy J. Goetz has worked in school law since 1995, first as a staff attorney with the Minnesota Disability Law Center, then as a complaint investigator at the Minnesota Department of Education, and most recently in private practice. Her practice has focused on legal issues involving special education disputes, discrimination and other civil rights claims, including harassment and bullying, discipline matters including expulsion, and juvenile court proceedings implicating educational failure. She has successfully raised and resolved hundreds of student and family claims through formal and informal means, obtaining favorable results that have improved individual educational outcomes, as well as impacting school and legal systems. Amy has litigated school claims in administrative hearings and in appeals through the federal courts. She has provided training and teaching to parents, attorneys, judges and other groups, as well as presentations as a guest lecturer in various education and law classes in the Twin Cities area. Before working in education law, Amy worked in legal services offices for nineteen years on issues including family law, child custody, adoption, juvenile court proceedings, housing, and government benefits.

Matthew Herron, *Think Different* Diplomat

Matthew Herron hails from Green River, Wyoming. He's currently studying Social Work at Western Wyoming Community College, and he plans to pursue a career in school-related social work. In his free time, Matt enjoys spending time with family and friends, swimming, hiking, listening to music, and studying fashion. He hopes that his story will inspire other students with learning disabilities to strive for success.

LeDerick Horne, *Think Different* Ambassador

LeDerick Horne, spent most of his time in school believing he did not have much of a future. A severe learning disability (LD) combined with low self-esteem led him to doubt he would be able to go to college or pursue a meaningful career. But in the challenging academic environment at Middlesex County College--and with the support offered for his disability through Project Connections, a Learning Disabilities Resource Program at the College--LeDerick became an outstanding student, compiling a 3.75 grade point average. He transferred to New Jersey City University and graduated with honors from NJCU in 2003.

Since graduation, LeDerick has become the head of his own real estate investment company, Horne & Associates, LLC, and was appointed the Board Chair of Project Eye-To-Eye. He is also recognized across the country as an advocate for people with disabilities. LeDerick has facilitated workshops, delivered keynote presentations, and spoken to thousands of students, teachers, and service providers about his experiences.

Kory Ingersoll, *Think Different* Diplomat

A native of Salt Lake City, Kory found his home in Star Valley, Wyoming, twelve years ago. A student at Western Wyoming Community College, Kory enjoys photography and travel. He's an avid sportsman who spends his free time hunting, hiking, camping, fishing, and riding motorcycles. He's thrilled to share his story of educational and personal empowerment with others in the hopes that it will make a positive impact.

Lenore Knudtson, Esq.

Lenore Knudtson completed her undergraduate work at Ball State University in Muncie, Indiana. After working for a brief time in juvenile probation, Lenore obtained a Masters +60 in School Psychology at the University of Wisconsin, River Falls. As a school psychologist, Lenore served children and young adults with disabilities in Minnesota schools for several years prior to attending law school at William Mitchell College of Law in St. Paul, Minnesota. Lenore is a member of the bar in Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Arizona and dedicates most of her practice to children and special education law.
