

2015 Reading State Snapshot Report Wyoming • Grade 8 • Public Schools


Overall Results

States/Jurisdictions

- In 2015, the average score of eighth-grade students in Wyoming was 269. This was higher than the average score of 264 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Wyoming in 2015 (269) was lower than their average score in 2013 (271) and was higher than their average score in 1998 (263).
- The percentage of students in Wyoming who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 36 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (38 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (31 percent).
- The percentage of students in Wyoming who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 81 percent in 2015. This percentage was smaller than that in 2013 (84 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (76 percent).





Funding Snapshot

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) uses both multiple choice and constructed-response test items to assess eighth graders' skills in two reading areas: Literary Texts and Informational Texts. Scale scores range from 0 to 500, wherein a 243 denotes NAEP's *Basic* achievement benchmark (i.e., approximately a "grade level" performance); 281 reflects *Proficient* results or competency on challenging material, and 323 is considered to be *Advanced*.

Per Capita Student Expenditures During 2011-2012




Achievement Levels

Wyoming was one of eight jurisdictions spending over \$15,000 per student during the 2011-2012 school year. Jurisdictions also at this spending level: Alaska, Connecticut, DC, New Jersey, New York, Rhode Island, and Vermont.

NOTE: Current expenditures include instruction, instruction-related, support services, and other elementary/secondary expenditures, but exclude expenditures on capital outlay, other programs, and interest on long term debt. Interschool transactions are excluded to prevent double-counting.

- Eighty-one (81) percent of Wyoming 8th graders scored at or above *Basic* on the 2015 reading assessment. This was higher than the nation's 75 percent.
- Wyoming had a higher percentage of 8th graders scoring at or above *Basic* on the 2015 reading assessment than Alaska, District of Columbia, New York and Rhode Island i.e., states with similar per student expenditures.
- The percentage of Wyoming eighth grade students performing at or above Basic on the 2015 assessment was not reliably different from Connecticut, New Jersey and Vermont.

Average Scale Scores




- In 2015, the average reading scale score for 8th grade students in Wyoming was 269; this was reliably higher than the national average (264).
- Wyoming eighth graders had an average reading scale score in 2015 that was not statistically different from Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nebraska, South Dakota or Utah.

Achievement Levels

- ► Eighty-one (81) percent of Wyoming's 8th graders scored at or above *Basic* on the 2015 reading assessment. This was higher than the nation's 75%
- The percentage of Wyoming's 8th graders scoring at or above *Basic* on reading in 2015 was not reliably different from Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nebraska, South Dakota or Utah.



National Snapshot

Wyoming and the Nation — Grade 8 Reading Scale Scores




- On the 2015 reading assessment, Wyoming 8th graders had an average scale score that was reliably higher than students in Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, California, District of Columbia, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Louisiana, Michigan, Mississippi, Nevada, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, and West Virginia.
- Wyoming 8th graders had an average scale score that was not statistically different from students in Colorado, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Jersey, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Virginia, Utah, Washington and Wisconsin.
- Wyoming 4th graders had an average scale score which was reliably lower than students in Connecticut, Department of Defense Schools, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and Vermont.

Student Groups Snapshot

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) uses both multiple choice and constructed-response test items to assess eighth graders' skills in two reading areas: Literary Texts and Informational Texts. Scale scores range from 0 to 500, wherein a 243 denotes NAEP's *Basic* achievement benchmark (i.e., approximately a "grade level" performance); 281 reflects *Proficient* results or competency on challenging material, and 323 is considered to be *Advanced*.



- On the NAEP 2015 reading assessment the proportion of eighth grade male students in Wyoming scoring at or above *Basic* (76 percent) was lower than female students (87 percent).
- The proportion of eighth grade Hispanic students (72 percent) in Wyoming scoring at or above Basic was lower than their White peers (84 percent). Sampling was not sufficient to permit reporting of reading performance for eighth grade Black, Native American and Asian students.
- Wyoming eighth graders qualifying for free or reduced price meals in the School Lunch Program and scoring at or above *Basic* (70 percent) was lower than students not eligible for the program (87 percent).
- Special education students scoring at or above Basic (38 percent) was lower than general education students (88 percent).
- Sampling was not sufficient to permit reporting of reading performance for eighth grade English Learners.



WY-US Student Gaps Snapshot

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) uses both multiple choice and constructed-response test items to assess fourth graders' skills in two reading areas: Literary Texts and Informational Texts. Scale scores range from 0 to 500, wherein a 208 denotes NAEP's *Basic* achievement benchmark (i.e., approximately a "grade level" performance); 238 reflects *Proficient* results or competency on challenging material, and 268 is considered to be *Advanced*.

Wyoming and National Results

In 2015, Wyoming eighth graders' scale scores in reading were above the average nationally.

Wyoming also had higher results in eight student groups: male and female students, Hispanic students, students from low income families (i.e., students qualifying for free or reduced price meals from the National School Lunch Program), Special Education students, and students in city, town, or rural schools (as defined by the Census Bureau).

Wyoming's White fourth graders and Non-eligible students (i.e., those not qualifying for free or reduced price meals from the National School Lunch Program) had average scale scores in reading that were not reliably different from their respective peer groups nationally.
