## Forty Ways to Make a More Positive Classroom Climate

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From the Book, *The Bully Free Classroom* by Allan L. Beane, Ph.D.

The classroom teacher is the person on the front line that can make a huge difference in the social climate of a school. There are many more strategies in the above-listed reference than can be listed here, but some of the ones that stand out are noted below:

- 1. Name bully behaviors. Take a class pledge of what *not* to do.
- 2. Share stories about bullying to build empathy.
- 3. Set specific rules regarding what will and will not be acceptable.
- 4. Designate your classroom as "bully-free."
- 5. Respond effectively and quickly to reports of bullying.
- 6. Intervene to incidents in real time if you witness bullying.
- 7. Teach friendship skills.
- 8. Set high expectations.
- 9. Learn more about your students.
- 10. **Identify roles models**.
- 11. Provide adequate supervision to classes and events.
- 12. Reward cooperation.

13. <b>Keep grades private</b> .	
14. Encourage random acts of kindness.	
15. Explore the lives of famous peacemakers.	
16. Change seating assignments when necessary.	
17. Affirm your students. Take every opportunity to say something positive to your students throughout the day.	
18. Assess the week. How did things go, are there areas that can be improved?	
19. Use humor where possible. It can be disarming and change the chemistry of a classroom.	f
20. Get students involved in service.	
21. Provide counseling when needed and opportunities permit.	
22. Empower parents. Share tips, tell them of your efforts. They can be a teacher's best allies.	
23. Mobilize witnesses. Minimize the number of "standbys" willing to do nothing.	
24. <b>Provide safe havens</b> .	
25. <b>Get students involved in groups</b> .	
26. Give students opportunities to shine.	
27. Have students keep journals.	
28. Have clear consequences in place.	

29. Teach power skills. This may involve demonstrations, roll-playing, discussion, and guided practice.
30. <b>Get other students involved</b> .
31. Set up a bully court. (This is more appropriate with older students.)
32. Help select students find mentors.
33. Utilize older students.
34. Use "Stop and Think."
35. Teach them to "Talk Sense" to themselves.
36. Give students meaningful responsibilities (Care of a project, an animal, etc.).
37. Be a good listener.
38. See your classroom through your students' eyes.
39. Network with other teachers, perhaps in a PLC environment, to ensure antibully protocols are in place.
40. To sum up the above thirty-nine book recommendations: Be the kind of teacher that lives the behavior you want to see in your students.
