> When World War II broke out, the U.S.government forced Sam Mihara, then 9, and his family to move from their home in San Francisco to a remote prison camp in northwest Wyoming, where they were imprisoned for three years. Together, 10 prison camps housed a total of 120,000 West Coast residents of Japanese ancestry, most of them U.S.-born American citizens. Sam will relate his experiences of life within the Heart Mountain Relocation Center.
