The Superintendent, Curriculum Coordinator, Virtual Education Coordinator, and Special Education Director for each school district submitting a **full-time virtual education program application or renewal for the 2024-25 school year** must review the proposed courses and curriculum for the program and complete and submit this assurance. If one person serves in each of the roles of Superintendent, Curriculum Coordinator, and Virtual Education Coordinator for the school district, a school board member must be selected to also review the curriculum and complete the assurance.
