Building Bridges with Early Childhood Partners... and Why it Matters to Student (and Family) Success

Presenter: Amy Reyes and Helena Wagner

Children entering kindergarten come from many different early learning backgrounds-from home to Head Start. Coordinating an accessible entry process, and understanding how districts can partner with ECE providers, creates a strong foundation for school success from entry point into the K-12 system. Partnerships with early care and education providers can be mutually beneficial for all involved: school administrators, teaching staff, families and children!

Consolidated Program Monitoring in eGMS

This presentation will provide an introduction to the monitoring module Ling has put in our eGMS. Crowdsourcing Evidenced-Based Decision-Making: A Collaborative Approach to Meeting This Requirement in Title II-A & Title IV-A

This interactive session opens with a focused review of evidence-based requirements for Title II-A and Title IV-A grants. Participants will then collaborate to share strategies for identifying impactful evidence to drive student learning in grant-funded programs. Share your district's successes with evidence-based practices, including planning, implementation, evaluation, and integration of ESSA's four tiers of evidence. Even if you have more questions than answers, join us to connect with fellow grant managers on this sometimes challenging requirement. You'll leave with a curated resource list developed during the session to support your district's evidence-based grant management practices.

eGMS Overview & Special Topics

Presenter: Diana Thompson and Jeannie Veytsman

The purpose of this session is to gain knowledge of the new educational grants management system and tools available to users as they work through the entire grants management cycle. The following major topics will be covered: navigating the system, creating funding applications, working on grant budgets and submitting applications for review. Special topics will include working on cash requests, application supplements and amendments, as well as the workflow for each of those processes. Diana and Jeannie will address some of the issues that users might encounter while working in the eGMS environment. In the end, we will discuss eGMS guides, training videos and other resources available to LEAs.

How Do I Use Title III Funds the Way They Were Prescribed Under ESSA?

Participants will gain knowledge and tools to help develop a comprehensive application on how Title III funds will be used as required by ESSA. Learn the requirements for implementing an LIEP, providing professional development, and conducting parent, family, and community engagement events in order to improve English language proficiency for English learners.

IDEA Allowable Use of Funds

Presenter: Deb Montoya and Kim Sanford

This session will define the criteria and parameters to determine the allowability of costs charged to the grants under the IDEA Part B 611 and 619. A focus on the specific ways LEAs can utilize IDEA Part B funding for providing special education and related services to students with disabilities, including decision trees to help in making allowable/allocable cost determinations.

IDEA Proportionate Share and CEIS Funds

Presenter: Deb Montoya and Kim Sanford

Proportionate Share: This portion of the session will review the IDEA's proportionate share requirements in allocating a specific portion of the Part B funds to provide equitable services to children with disabilities who are enrolled in private schools by their parents/guardians. Key points will cover the purpose, calculation, control of funds by LEA, and consultation required to determine appropriate special education services.

CEIS: This portion of the session will discuss IDEA's CEIS (coordinated early intervening services) requirements in Part B 611 funds. Topics covered will include the CEIS percentage of funds allowed, student eligibility, voluntary versus mandatory use of CEIS funds, focus on early intervention, and reporting requirements. Tools for CEIS tracking and data will be shared.

IDEA Part B Application and MOE

Presenter: Deb Montoya and Kim Sanford

This session will review the application process and requirements for the IDEA Part B 611 and 619 grant funds and completing the application within the new eGMS system. The basics of the federal requirement of MOE (Maintenance of Effort) to remain eligible for full federal grant funding and the MOE calculations and exceptions will be reviewed.

Indirect Cost Is Not Complicated

Indirect cost got you down? Les and Diana will dispel the myth that indirect cost management is difficult. They will define indirect cost, the associated rate, how to calculate, and discuss reasons why indirect cost may benefit your school district. Innovation in Afterschool & Summer Learning Spaces

The presentation starts with a brief overview of MTSS as defined by the Wyoming Department of Education, followed by hearing from a district that is getting great results from its MTSS implementation. Finally, it summarizes federal and state funding sources and resources to support team planning activities.
