Stage II: Career Planning

Encouraging students to explore a variety of career options and develop relevant skills empowers them to take ownership of their future. As they investigate pathways aligned with their interests and strengths, they begin to understand the qualifications and experiences needed for success. This stage promotes active engagement, builds readiness, and supports intentional planning toward career attainment.

Discovery Process

Career Planning, the focus is on aligning the strengths, needs, and interests of the student with potential vocational goals. Teachers implement discovery-based transition activities in the context of the classroom, the school, and the community within the curriculum framework. Career Planning brings exposure to assorted opportunities for community involvement and occupations. This stage typically focuses on middle school-aged students, but may be helpful for older students who are just beginning the Discovery Process.

Documentation of Interests and Employment Skills

The information in the Life Book becomes the foundation for a Career Portfolio. Additional information, targeted more specifically toward future employment, continues to be collected at home and school. Portfolios containing pictures and narrative information are developed for each student to be used to represent the student to a prospective employer. The Career Portfolio moves with the student from grade to grade and can be shared with the agency that will support the student as they transition into the post-secondary world of work.
